FROM THE PRESIDENT



Les Simpson

attended the 90th Birthday celebrations for Bob Langholm in February. Bob has been involved with bonsai for a very long time and is still actively involved in teaching, demonstrating and maintaining a reasonably large collection of bonsai. He was president of the Auckland Bonsai Society soon after it was formed back in the mid 1960's and was the president for 18 years (at that stage the club had a different name). He was awarded the Queen's Service Medal several years ago for services to bonsai. In July 2017 he was awarded a Certificate of Commendation, by the Consul-General of Japan in New Zealand, in recognition of his distinguished service in contributing to the deepening of mutual understanding and friendship between Japan and other nations. One of the things that I recall about Bob is the number of demonstrations he has given. He is particularly good at giving demos to people new to bonsai. Over the years he would have attracted a very large number of people into the world of bonsai.

Our club is presently involved in bonsai beginners classes on Thursday nights. We have a series of four classes with a different tutor each night. Places were limited to 10 people. We had about 20 register so it was sad to have to accept just the first 10 who registered. I took the first session 'An Introduction to Bonsai' which included a brief history of bonsai. As part of the research for this introduction I read



the history of the Auckland Bonsai Society. I was interested to see that the person who started the bonsai club in Auckland before Bob Langholm became president was in the N Z J Force that occupied Japan at the end of World War II. He no doubt became first acquainted with bonsai as a result. The bonsai books that contain a blurb on the origins of bonsai all mention that this was the way bonsai spread to the West particularly the USA.

I had an interesting tramp recently to a place called Waitanguru which is about 12 km from Piopio south of Te Kuiti. This is limestone country. There were interesting limestone formations and the bushy bits featured trees with long roots growing over the limestone formations. Both settings were very good inspiration for saikei. The

farmer who owned the property guided us and gave us a good commentary. He showed us some fossilised shark teeth embedded in the limestone that had been there for millions of years. A lot of the bush on this farm was fenced off and placed in trust so that no future owner of the farm could destroy the bush. There was a Lord of the Rings site a short distance away from the farm we visited.

SANDRA QUINTAL'S VISIT TO DUNEDIN

The Otago club took advantage of the Waitangi Day holiday to invite Sandra Quintal down South. On the Tuesday night she gave a demonstration to our club meeting and the following day held a couple of workshops.

The emphasis for the demonstration to the club was on the shohin class of trees – this is more than just small trees, 20 cm from the pot rim. She had brought down in her luggage some of her trees to show how she transports trees around. See the last issue of the Bonsai Times for more

details, not only from Sandra, but other people also. Many of the principles Sandra discussed apply to all bonsai in general, although there were some things specific for Shohin. I like the idea of a Sumo Shohin – this is "fat tree" with the ratio of 1 to 3 (width to height). It is always interesting to discuss soil mixes as there are probably as many different options as there are bonsai artists. How she treats moss to place on the trees was interesting; I have since heard of at least one club member who has tried it. Anyone got an old food mixer?







For shohin, displaying the trees is an important factor and Sandra showed how it is easy to do this without the need for expensive stands by using cloth over boxes. The orientation and placement within the display is important and the display should comprise different species. Unfortunately, we ran out of time before Sandra could show us how to air-layer – will leave that until the next visit.

We decided to have a shohin section in our Trees of the Month display and had a large number of trees brought along by members. Sandra was asked to judge this section; the winner was a Kowhai by Joy Morton.

We always finish the night with supper, which gives us a chance for an informal chat. Our club meeting had members with many years of experience as well as

some new members to the club, their first meeting. All enjoyed the night.

The next day we held two workshops. It was nice to have one of our out-of-town members involved. The tree she worked on with Sandra transformed significantly. People worked on a various range of trees, though not all would be shohin. It is always fun at workshops to see the trees transform over the space of a few hours. One of our members has found it more useful to be an observer than to work on a tree as you get see and hear the comments about all the trees.

Our thanks to Sandra for a very informative demonstration on shohin trees and we all look forward to the further development of the trees she gave guidance on in the workshops.





CREATING AN AGED LOOK FROM YOUNG MATERIAL.

recently did a workshop on this subject for the Hamilton and Bay of Plenty bonsai clubs.

You may well ask 'why create an aged look?' After all, people spend a fortune trying to look YOUNG. In the bonsai world we do the reverse and put a big effort into creating AGE.

Age gives a tree character. One of the things most valued in a bonsai is age. Those of you who have exhibited bonsai will be well used to the question 'how old is your tree?' It is often a bonsai novice who is asking. They realise that age is an important feature to have. In its annual shows Hamilton Bonsai Club indicates the years in training as a bonsai on the name tag for the tree. It is vital to note that it is perceived age and not actual age that is important. You can have a tree 100 years old which does not look old. A tree dug from the ground and placed in a pot with the right techniques applied can have an aged look in just a few years. Picture in your mind a bonsai that you have seen that is appealing to you and has

an aged look. What are the features that contribute to this aged look? I asked this question of both the Hamilton and Bay of Plenty bonsai clubs and this is the list that resulted

- 1 Nebari and roots exposed roots. Nebari means root flare. Drama in this area can certainly enhance a feeling of age.
- 2 Trunk taper good taper from bottom to top.
- 3 Trunk movement primary and secondary bends in the trunk. A branch is normally present at the primary node points.
- 4 Height/diameter ratio 6:1 or less
- 5 Bark texture i.e. pines normally have very good bark texture.



6 Branches.

- General downwards movement.
- Branch movement sharp turns and twists. If you regrow branches they always appear more juvenile than the originals.
- Branch placement smaller internodes between branches towards the apex.
- Length and diameter of branches reduce towards the apex with the bottom branch the longest and thickest and normally located about one third the height of the tree.
- Ramification primary, secondary,

- tertiary etc growth.
- 7 Leaf, flower and fruit size small leaves; small flowers; small fruit. All have to be in scale.
- 8 Jins and sharis they can tell a story about past happenings or accidents that the tree has been exposed to.
- 9 Foliage clouds on young trees you can get one solid mass of foliage. On older trees the foliage masses become more isolated and sparse. Individual clouds will fragment seeming to consist of multiple smaller clouds.
- 10 Crown domed or rounded crown. Young trees tend to be spiky.



NZBA Facebook

NZBA is currently running a video on their Facebook page promoting bonsai in New Zealand with links to the clubs who consented to having their details included. Some clubs have already had success with enquiries.

NZ Shohin Trophy

A new trophy has been donated by the NZ Shohin Club & Lindsay Muirhead. This will be awarded this year at the National Convention for the best shohin display in the National Show.

Lindsay Muirhead Trophy

Lindsay has donated a trophy for best overall suiseki in the national show (this includes both the NZ and imported suiskei). This will be awarded for the first time at the 2019 National Convention.

Club Manual

A hard copy of this manual was sent out to all clubs at the end of last year. A copy will be placed on the NZBA website. The Club Manual brings together all NZBA policies and rules along with ideas and suggestions on how to recruit and retain members, organise an annual programme of activities, or an event. It is designed as a repository for all NZBA policies, rules, forms, and ideas to assist clubs in running and operating their clubs.

NZBA committee members will be making a second telephone contact with the president of all clubs in the next month or two. This is so the NZBA committee members can pass on what the NZBA committee have been up to and find out what clubs have been up to.

NZ Demonstrator Proposal

Our current list of national demonstrators is being updated and will be placed on a clubs-only section of the NZBA website. This is not yet operational; we will advise


